#### PART 1 – HOW WE WILL WORK TOGETHER

This Joint Action Plan between Natural England and the Peak District National Park Authority sets out what the two organisations wish to achieve by working together in the Peak District. Our organisations start from the basis of common statutory objectives and recognition and respect for the strengths which we both bring to the relationship. While there are many areas of synergy there are also important differences, which we will use to our collective advantage:

#### **Natural England brings**

- substantial national capacity and expertise on policy and evidence
- a national coverage which embraces all designated landscapes (National Parks and Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty) and beyond – allowing 'good practice' experience to be brought in from elsewhere and disseminated more widely
- formal involvement in the selection of National Park Authority members appointed by the Secretary of State
- leadership in the delivery of Government goals relevant to the natural environment
- regional-level influencing
- local delivery expertise, backed by agri-environment resources

#### The Peak District National Park Authority

- has deep knowledge of the Peak District with strong connections to local communities and land managers
- has expertise in, and understanding of, a range of issues on a landscape scale
- brings delivery on the ground and leadership of delivery by others through our National Park Management Plan
- has a wider remit which embraces social and economic dimensions
- enjoys strong links with the local government and regional planning frameworks
- is responsible for a breathtaking environment and ensures people are able to enjoy and take inspiration from the finest landscapes

In the Peak District, Natural England and the Peak District National Park Authority (PDNPA) affirm the common vision for all national parks shared between Natural England and the English National Parks Authorities Association (ENPAA):

"To ensure that the landscapes, wildlife, geodiversity and cultural heritage of English National Parks are conserved, enhanced and managed for the benefit, well-being and enjoyment of present and future generations. We aspire for National Parks to be exemplars in sustainable development and so contribute to a better quality of life for all."

There are many ways in which the aspirations and work of the Peak District National Park Authority and Natural England interact. These range from involvement in spatial planning and joint projects on promoting biodiversity to addressing the effects of transport on protected landscapes. A major area of joint effort is the delivery of agri-environment schemes where the focus is on collaboration between local front-line staff to communicate and co-ordinate activity to achieve maximum efficiency of delivery and environmental gain.

This Joint Action Plan does not seek to describe all of the relationship that the Peak District National Park Authority and Natural England enjoy. It does not include day to day activity or routine collaboration. Nor does this Agreement have a legally binding status. Rather it identifies the major areas where working together, we will make a real difference in achieving our vision, providing a focus for joint activity and a framework to support joint action.

Both organisations commit to working together to achieve tangible results over the 3-year lifetime of this Joint Action Plan, both in the key areas identified and in any others that might subsequently be added.

In delivering these actions, we have regard to the following principles:

- we will always consider opportunities for co-operation and joint representation when developing strategic documents in our area
- at all other levels across our operations, we will look for ways to improve outcomes and provide public value by working together and in partnership with others
- in any joint projects, we will demonstrate the public benefits of our relationship through joint communications and media
- we will ensure that in all our activities, both organisations are aware of and have full regard for each other's statutory duties
- we will work to ensure that high quality data is gathered and made available to ourselves and partners, to inform the decisions taken for the environment
- we will continue to share training and workshops for National Park Authority and Natural England staff.

To deliver this, the Peak District National Park Authority and Natural England have agreed to deliver jointly across a series of headline issues. These are:

CLIMATE CHANGE: DELIVERY OF HEALTHY PEAK DISTRICT UPLANDS







The focus of our current activity lies with the Moors for the Future Partnership, a major joint project to deliver multiple benefits at a landscape scale for the internationally important moorlands of the Peak District. We will take forward this vital work to showcase the role that restored healthy peatlands play in carbon capture and climate change adaptation and mitigation alongside its other benefits for people and the environment.

 DIVERSITY OF PEOPLE AND PLACE: ACCESS, ENJOYMENT AND UNDERSTANDING OF THE PEAK DISTRICT

Currently both partners promote public access, enjoyment and understanding of the National Park's exceptional environment. We have worked together e.g. to fund resources for ranger services, interpretation and education delivery.

This Joint Action Plan will build on this through greater cooperation on a number of key projects including the Mosaic project, development of a volunteering strategy and joint delivery of the Health and Wellbeing agenda.



 LANDSCAPE: HIGH QUALITY LAND MANAGEMENT DELIVERED THROUGH PARTNERSHIP

To contribute to the European Landscape Convention, we will jointly deliver the Landscape Strategy and Action Plan for the Peak District.

Our land management services already work closely, for example, through our joint Peak District Land Management Advisory Service, to deliver a strongly consistent message to Peak District farmers and landowners, advising on grants, regulation and links between a high quality environment and a thriving local economy. With other partners, we will innovate through joint approaches to deliver a more efficient and effective service to land managers, so meeting the immensely challenging targets facing our landscape, biodiversity and cultural heritage.



#### STATUTORY RESPONSIBILITIES: A STRONG PARTNERSHIP



Both organisations have a wide range of statutory and legal responsibilities on land management and in the planning process. These include development control, protection of special wildlife and places, promoting access to land and public enjoyment. We will improve efficiency by developing mechanisms to ensure consistent and joint approaches on regulation and other areas of joint interest.
