SK 19767110: Great Longstone, Railway Station: The stone station was built in 1863 and is now a private residence. It was on the Rowsley-Chinley main line. (1).

Grade II listed Railway Station, now house. Built in 1863, perhaps by Edward Walters, who designed Rowsley Station, or William Barlow, the railway company engineer. Built of gritstone ashlar and Welsh slate roofs with a band of fishscale slates. [For full description see Listed Building Record DDR3657]. (3)

Stone built station built in 1836 on the MR Rowsley-Buxton extension. Closed in 1962 and now an access point to the Moinsal Trail. (4)

Grade II* listed Hall (Included in the Interim List as Longstone Hall). An impressive house of mid 18th century with earlier wing on left. The main block is of brick with stone dressings.

Barn at The Hall: probably 17th century. Grade II listed. Stone with stone slated roof.

Stables at The Hall: probably 17th century. Grade II listed. Stone with stone slated roof and ocped gables.

Gate Piers at the Hall. Grade II listed. 18th century. Square on plan. Stone with channelled masonry, moulded caps and large ball finials. (2)

The Hall (formerly listed as Longstone Hall): Grade II* small country house. 17th century and 1747. Rubble limestone with gritstone dressings to earlier part and rubble limestone and brick with gritstone dressing to later part. Stone slate roof to earlier part, roof hidden behind parapets to later part. South elevation has lower 17th century wing to left. All much restored in 1929 by Sir Hubert Worthington.

Upper Stables at the Hall: Grade II listed. Stable block. Early 19th century. Rubble limestone with gritstone dressings and quoins. Cement tile roof.

Gate piers, attached boundary walls, pump and trough at the Hall: Grade II listed. Mid 18th and 19th century. Rubble limestone and gritstone ashlar. The wall to the east continues as an enclosure to a walled garden and has an 18th century gateway. Another wall runs north towards the Hall, dividing the drive from the enclosed garden. The wall follows the road to the west to the entrance to the stableyard, where there is another pair of gate piers. Next to them, a 19th century fluted metal pump and a stone trough.

Lower Stables at the Hall: Grade II listed. 17th and early 19th century. Rubble limestone with gritstone dressings and quoins. Stone slate roof with stone coped gables. (3)

Originally Longstone Hall was a larger version of Eyam Hall, but was replaced in 1747 by a brick house, unusual in the Peaks. The building has three well spaced bays and is 2½ storeys. The house was built by Thomas Wright. A house was recorded here in 1300. (4)

Description

A Georgian T-shaped house, extensively altered in 1871. The Neo-Tudor exterior was added in 1897. It is castellated with a tall asymmetrically placed tower. (1,2)

Thornbridge Hall comprises a Grade II listed hall and stableblock, now combined and converted into an educational establishment. It has an 18th century core with 1871 additions. It was completely altered in 1897 by Charles Hadfield in a Neo-Tudor style. There were also 20th century additions. The building was constructed of coursed squared limestone with sandstone dressings and quoins. There are various re-used carvings from other country houses, which have been imported to the hall in around the 1930s. (3)

When Mr George Jobson Marples purchased Thornbridge (circa 1898), it had practically only about 20 acres of parkland. Of the adjoining fields with their rough stone dividing walls, about 100 acres were purchased, the walls removed, plantations laid out, and ornamental lakes made, and an approach road from the Bakewell side was constructed. The garden on the south side of the Hall is laid out in two main terraces, the upper one being separated from the lower by a wall four feet high, which is clothed in evergreen creepers. Both these terraces are in grass and are intended for promenades for playing games. From the main promenade, a Dutch garden with lakes and cascades is seen whilst on the rising ground beyond many hundreds of large Rhododendrons and other shrubs are planted. The whole of the alterations in the park and garden were entrusted to Messrs J Backhouse and Son nurserymen of York. (4)

Description

In 1262, Griffin founded a chantry in the chapel of St. Giles of Great Longstone. The church was bestowed with the same offering in the 17th century. There is no trace of Norman work in the present building, although there is evidence for a church of similar dimensions on the site in the 13th century. The present building was altered in the 15th century and underwent a complete restoration recently (1877) and re-opened in 1873. (1)

St. Giles Church, Longstone, is 13th century with 14th century and perpendicular features. It was restored in 1873. (2)

[SK 20027190] St. Giles Church. (3, 6)

Grade I listed Church dating from the 13th century, 14th century, 16th century and 1871-3. It was built by Richard Norman Shaw. Rubble limestone with gritstone dressings and quoins. Lead roofs with coped gables and plain parapets. Stone slate roof to porch. West tower, nave with aisles and south porch, and chancel. Tower of three stages with low attached building to north, the stages divided by a chamfer and string course. West face has a trefoiled ogee lancet and 2-light Perp bell-openings. The south face has a 2-light recessed and chamfered mullioned bell-opening at the top of the second stage and a similar 2-light opening immediately above. Single light opening above, obscured by a clock face. North face has a similar 2-light opening and single light above. East face has a single light opening and a clock face. Crenellated parapet and four crocketed pinnacles. The tower top was rebuilt in 1872-3. Nave and clerestory have plain round-headed windows of 16th century or 17th century type. The clerestory has five pairs and the south aisle has a 2-light, a 4-light and a 2-light. The north aisle has two single and a pair of 13th century lancets. Gabled south porch with 13th century porch entrance with double chamfered arch, chamfered responds and moulded imposts. Single chamfered south door with hoodmould. Chancel has, to south, a low priest's doorway flanked on each side by deeply set 2-light windows under flat heads. Cusped ogee tracery. One similar window to north. 5-light east window with panel tracery. The chancel windows and north vestry are by Norman Shaw. Interior has six-bay arcades with octagonal piers and abaci and double chamfered arches. Similar 19th century chancel arch with nailhead in the abaci. Double chamfered tower arch dying into the imposts. Excellently preserved 15th century or early 16th century roofs in nave, aisles and chancel. Stained glass, east window 1873 and north aisle windows by Heaton, Butler and Bayne. Three windows in the south aisle dated 1897, 1908 and 1907 designed by Shaw and executed by Heaton, Butler & Bayne. Another south aisle window dated 1887. Brass to Rowland Eyre 1624 in South Chapel. Brass eagle lectern dated 1892. In the nave are two hatchments either side of the chancel arch and three more over the tower arch. At the west end of the south aisle are two charity boards dated 1838. (5, 7)

The bell of St Giles' Church is a good example of the work of the the founder T I Hedderly of Nottingham, dated to 1763. (8)

Description

The possible route of the Portway is suggested by various pieces of evidence: three places in Derbyshire are called Alport; documentary references to the name Portway are known from near Bakewell, from Sandiacre, and from near Coxbench; two old mines are called Portway. A line drawn through these points is not haphazard, but runs straight across the county. Despite being obscured by the construction of roads and other later developments, it is considered feasible to find evidence on the ground, or on old maps, which demonstrates the line of the trackway. A chain of ancient hillforts is apparently based upon the Port Way, and a pre-Roman origin for the trackway, making use of natural advantages, is suggested. Part was probably re-used in Roman times and down to the 18th century, with the introduction of some short cuts up steep gradients or across streams which were avoided by the old road. (1)

Consideration is given to the four theories advanced for the meaning of the name 'Port': a Saxon name for a town; a place of shelter; an ancient British name for a military way; a Norman name for a road. (2)

A branch of the Portway is suggested running from south of Grangemill to Chapel-en-le-Frith and perhaps beyond. (3)

There is place-name evidence for the trackway of unknown, but probably prehistoric, date known in early records as Portway. This name is still used over short stretches, and an attempt to link the various portions was first made by Cockerton, who has ably demonstrated its course from a point west of Bakewell to Sandiacre on the Nottinghamshire boundary, and also established its northerly continuation by way of Castlegate. References to this track, supporting Cockerton's conclusions, have been noted in several areas from the 13th century onwards. The meaning of the name is 'road leading to a town', but there is no evidence which the town is, though from its crossing of the Nottinghamshire boundary it would appear to be leading to Nottingham. Further occurrences of the name Portway indicate that an old road ran from near Derby to Uttoxeter, and the three place-name references suggest the probable line followed. Although there is no evidence for its age, it probably linked Little Chester with Uttoxeter and is pre-English. (4)

A prehistoric trackway is postulated, and mapped, from an ancient ford, crossing the River Derwent near Milford (SK 351 451), via Wirksworth, Grangemill, Winster, Alport, and Ashford to Wardlow (SK 181 747). From here it is suggested that the trackway split, with one branch heading for Mam Tor (SK 128 837), and the other for Torside (SK 077 965). (5)

Description

The route of a Roman road has been identified aiming initially south-westwards from Brough, possibly heading for Carsington, where a Roman settlement has been excavated. Compared with other Derbyshire roads it is of above average width, an indication of a road of some importance. This status in Roman times did not ensure its survival as a known Roman road, although there is evidence that as a through route it was well known in medieval times. It left the fort from the southeast gate as a double carriageway shared with Batham Gate. After 100 yards (90 metres) it separated and turned south-eastwards to cross the Bradwell Brook (confirmed by probe). Once over the brook it changed direction to the southwest. The first three miles lie along the eastern flanks of Bradwell Dale, laid out so as to cross the lowest point of the pass at the end of the valley, Windmill. It achieves this with one course correction to round the hill shoulder which blocks a clear line of sight from fort to pass. It has suffered badly because of several erosion gullies in the soft and unstable overburden along the valley sides, no doubt one reason for the abandonment of the line by later traffic. Up to now it has not been proved beyond Windmill. It is thought likely that it would change direction there, aim towards the pass at Wardlow, SK181748, and then continue to the southeast towards Ashford. However, such a route remains conjectural. (1)

Projected routes have been marked, however they cannot be fully determined due to the lack of field work. (2)

The Manchester, Buxton, Matlock and Midlands Junction Railway Act of 1846 led to the establishment of the upper section of the line between Ambergate and Rowsley, followed by its extension to Buxton under the Midland Railway (Rowsley and Buxton) Act of 1860. The Ambergate to Rowsley section opened on June 4 1849, with the Buxton extension being opened between 1863 and 1867. By 1871 the Midland Railway had taken over the whole of the line. George Stephenson was appointed engineer in 1846. In drawing up plans it is believed two curves were proposed at Ambergate to join the main line, although only the north one was put in. This passed straight through the station house of the North Midland line, which was dismantled and re-erected close to the northern portal of Toadmoor Tunnel. The North Junction and associated sidings gave access for freight traffic, whilst a line running off the outside of the curve towards the rear of the existing station served a new platform for passenger trains. The line south of Ambergate was changed between 1862 and 1863 when considering the traffic requirements for the line extension to Manchester; it was changed again in 1873, creating a new station, a new middle curve line and three junctions. (1)

The early 18th century bridge in the yard of the Cromford Mill complex pre-dates Arkwright's development of the Cromford Mill site. It bridges the Bonsall Brook and originally carried the public road which linked Matlock Bath to Cromford Bridge and to the road to Wirksworth. When Arkwright constructed his second mill in 1776-77, the new building blocked the road. It was soon after this development that he improved the alternate route between the Cromford road and Matlock Bath by cutting through a section of Scarthin Rock, so creating a more manageable route for wheeled vehicles. The road through Scarthin Rock was not cut down to valley level until 1818, when the turnpike road to Belper was constructed. Joseph Wright's representations of the mill by night and by day indicate how much of the mill would have been visible from higher up the valley before the engineering works associated with the creation of the turnpike road, now the A6, destroyed the natural slope of the valley from Cromford Market Place to the Mills. Nobody knows if there were earlier houses on the site, though Bess of Hardwick and her second husband bought the Ashford and Sheldon estate in the fourth year of their marriage, two years before they began to build the first house at Chatsworth. The evidence is not conclusive, but it is highly probable that 'Churchdale' was built sometime between 1768 and 1831, where it was noted that the Duke of Devonshire spent £448 19s for 'the repair of the house and outbuildings at Churchdale'. The house as it is seen today was probably built for the Duke of Devonshire's Chatsworth agent. Samuel Smithers lived there when he was agent in the 1840s, his predecessor WA Ashby was almost certainly there in 1830 and others may have occupied the house while they held the office before that. Originally as small, simple, double-fronted house, Churchdale grew gradually over the years. The house is a puzzle of different periods and different styles. One of the best features of Churchdale is the curving staircase with its metal balusters and wooden handrail. (2)

Description

Thornbridge was part of the estate of the Longsdon family of Little Longstone and was held by them from the 12th century until 1790, when James Longsdon sold it to his business partner Andrew Morewood, a Manchester merchant. Morewood began to rebuild the house in the Classical style, his son John Morewood continuing the work which he complemented with a modest park. John Morewood was succeeded by his brother, George, and after his death, by his son-in-law, James McConnell, who in 1859 sold it back to the Longsdons. The Longsdon family retained much of the estate but put the Hall and its grounds up for sale, these being purchased by John Sleigh, a Leek manufacturer. In 1871 Sleigh sold the Hall and 185 acres (c. 77ha) of land to Frederick Craven who commissioned the architect J B Mitchell-Withers to rebuild the Hall in the Jacobean style, with stained-glass windows by William Morris and Edward Burne-Jones. In 1896 the Hall was again sold, this time to George 'Jobson' Marples, who immediately enlarged the estate to over 400 acres (c. 166ha) and then commissioned Charles Hadfield of Sheffield to alter the Hall, add stables and build lodges on the boundary of his new park. He also laid out formal gardens around the Hall to designs by Simeon Marshall of James Backhouse and Son's nursery in York, and in 1903 built the private railway station known as 'Woodlands'. When Marples died in 1929 the estate was sold to Charles Boot of the construction firm Henry Boot. Boot embellished the Hall and gardens with an assortment of artefacts acquired during the course of his business, hence the presence of balustrading, urns and a fountain from Clumber Park, Nottinghamshire, and marble statues which came his way while working on a land reclamation scheme in Greece.
