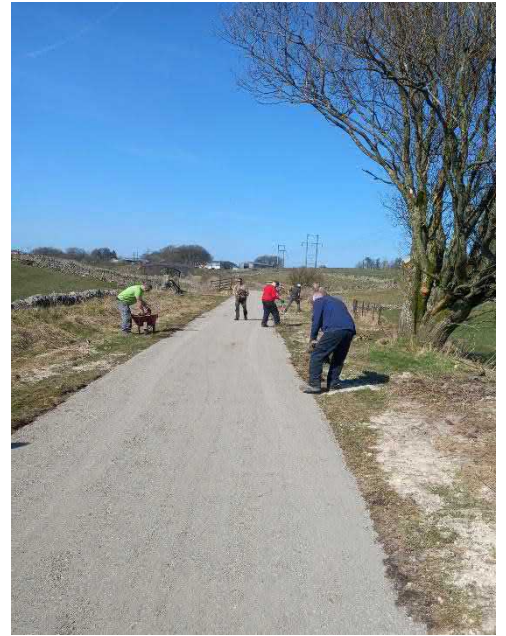
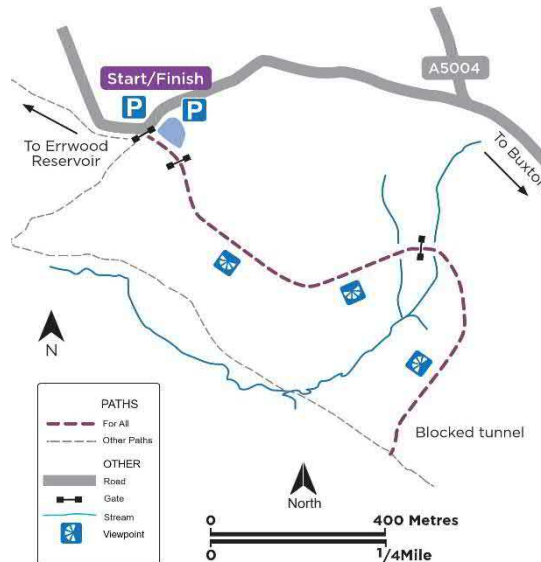

Welcome to The Tissington Trail

This is Mapleton Lane

The Tissington Trail is a traffic-free, multi-user accessible route, which is open to all.



During your visit you may see walkers, cyclists, horse riders and those using mobility equipment to enjoy the trail. Please respect other visitors, maintain safe distances, and slow-down, especially when the trail is busy. Take extra care on bridges, embankments, and inclines.

The Tissington Trail is a former railway line last used in the 1960s. This is why many of the locations along the trail are known as stations and you may see features such as former platforms, signal boxes, tunnels or 'cuttings' in the landscape.

This is one of a number of all-user routes maintained by the Peak District National Park Authority. Some sections of the trail are also cared for by Derbyshire County Council. A tranquil refuge for wildlife and people.
Please enter the site on foot and avoid
cliff faces.



In pre-glacial times, sand accumulated in large depressions in the Limestone. This sand has been excavated for use in local industries leaving an intricate landscape of steep sided depressions, limestone cliffs, ponds and sand waste heaps. The geological features are some of the largest in the area and they are unique to this part of Derbyshire.

The flowers and wildlife that have colonised the pits are of interest because they contain species that are not generally found on the intensively managed limestone plateaus surrounding the site.
